



Male and Female Unemployment Rates








Male-Female Employment In Montana by Industry, 2005-2009




 Women delay pregnancy or limit number of children during recessions



College Attendance Rates of High School Completers Ages 18-24








Male and Female Percentages of College Students






Median Real Annual Earnings Montana, by Industry and Gender


2008-2009
